translation—"Because when we will begin by cutting throats, we may calculate upon having our throats cut in the end; he (the viceroy) was in possession of undoubted information, that all the people of the surrounding country were in arms, and wanted only the occasion to put themselves in array against the royal authority, and that the same dispositions were manifested in every other part of the country, especially the people of Guacheta, Suta, Tinxaca, Lenquesaque, Paguira, and all the valley of **St. Ecce Mano, and the parish of Sombradera.**"

The patriotic army of **New Granada** assembled at **Casanare**, had been augmented to a considerable amount, by volunteers from the interior. This place, **Casanare**, has been all along the rendezvous of the Patriots of New Granada, & it was there the remaining hopes of freedom in that section of South America were rallied, and the government re-established, after the ferocious and truly royal barbarian Morillo, had consigned to the gibbet every man or woman who could write or read.

The communication between Panama and Lima, on the Pacific, has been entirely cut off, by the number of republican cruizers on that coast. Their ships carrying the flags of Buenos Ayres, Chili, Venezuela, New Granada, and Mexico, have established rendezvous along the whole coast from Chili to Panama, and obtain supplies and carry on a lucrative commerce with the inhabitants, and obtain all supplies with facility.

The van guard of the Venezuelan army, has opened its communication with the army of New Granada, at Casanare, and one unbroken chain of posts is thus established along the interior, from Casanare, along the Apure to Angostura, on the Atlantic. The operations of **Aury**, from Bayo Honda to Khagres, have been propitious and timely; they come in and aid at the same moment the happy state of things in Chili; while the flotilla in the Pacific, operating on the coast of Popayan and Choco, all tend to promote the cause of independence in New Granada; nor can these operations fail to produce signal consequences in Peru and Mexico. The project of putting an end to the Spanish project in America, by seizing on Panama, appears to have been still in view. In the beginning of 1812, a vast contract was entered into in the U. S. by the government of Buenos Ayres & Venezuela conjointly, for 50,000 stand of arms, but the execution of this contract, by some means, failed—and the plan was also, thereby frustrated.

The earthquake of Caraccas, was however, more fatal to this design, as the destruction of men and arms, could not be remedied, at that period by men & arms from any other quarter. The second attempt to carry this plan into execution, was the project at Port-au-Prince, prepared in 1816, to be conducted by gene-
