BILLS PASSED.

To vest the states interest in the property of Josi Masick, late of Burke county deceased, in the sisters of said deceased.

For the relief of Lewis Lynch.

To sell the States interest in lots of land, in the late purchase which have been or hereafter may be relinquished to the State, or declared fraudulently drawn.

To facilitate the recovery of personal property in certain cases.

Mr. Crawford of Columbia, reported instantly a bill, to amend an act, to incorporate the Bank of Darien, passed December 15, 1818, and for the removal of the same, which was read the first time.

The Senate took up and agreed to the report of the committee to whom was referred, the subject of procuring a plan for the enlargement of the State House.

Fourteen bills of the House were read the 3d time and passed.

Tuesday, Dec. 18

Mr. Crawford of Hancock, moved, to reconsider so much of the Journal of yesterday, as relates to the rejection of the bill, to prescribe a permanent system of Internal Improvement—Yeas 42—Nays 21.

The Senate took up the order of the day, relative to the Governor's disapproval of a resolution, originating in this branch of the General Assembly, upon the proposition of the Bank of Darien, for the gradual redemption of her bills, and on agreeing to the original report of the 21st November last, and disapproved by the Governor on the 1st December 1827. The report &c. was adopted by a constitutional majority—Yeas 52—Nays 17.

Mr. Anderson, laid on the table a resolution, the object of which is, to disapprove of all attempts to get up another candidate for the Presidency, and to make a pledge, that all honorable means will be used to advance the election of Gen. Andrew Jackson.

Sixteen bills of the House of Representatives were read the second time, and sixteen the first time.

which was read.

Mr. Dougherty, from the committee to whom was referred the charges preferred by Jos. Blackshear against Moses Fort, Judge of the Southern Circuit in this State, presented a report, which was read.

On motion of Mr. Dougherty, Resolved, That the witnesses subpoenaed by the committee to investigate the conduct of Judge Fort, be discharged from their attendance on said committee.

BILLS PASSED.

To alter and amend the 7th sec. of the 1st art. of the constitution of the State of Georgia, so as to reduce the representation of this State in the Legislature.—Yeas 89, Nays 19.

To establish an additional election district in the counties of Fayette and Wilkes.

To amend the 13th sec of the 9th div. of the penal code.

For the removal of persons from land not condemned by law.

Mr. Dougherty, laid on the table the following resolution. The counsel for Judge Fort whose conduct has been arraigned before this House, having requested to be heard in his defence,

Therefore, Resolved, That the counsel for Judge Fort, be admitted when the subject shall come before the House for consideration, and the same having been read.

Mr. Stiles, moved that it lie on the table till June next, whereupon the Yeas were 30—Nays 72.

The resolution was then ordered to lie on the table for the present.

The committee on agriculture and internal improvement, to whom was referred the report of the Commissioners for the improvement of the navigation of the Oconee river, have examined the same, and report,

That the labor on the river seems to be directed with some judgment, and the result promises to be advantageous. A contract has been made for the erection of a lock, and dam at the Whetstone Shoals, according to the plan of the Civil Engineer; the work is progressing and its completion may be confidently expected in the ensuing summer.

The funds and property of the Commissioners consist in 160 shares of State Bank Stock, \$20,000 Darien money in deposit, and \$700 for negro line, 19 negro men, and flats and apparatus common for removing obstructions from rivers in this State.

This amount is liable to a deduction of 6500 dollars, the contract price for the lock and dam at the Whetstone Shoals. The balance will be applicable for future improvements on said river.
