WESTERN TRIUMPH.—The Grand Jury of Cherokee county, at August Term, 1833, presented the proceedings of the late Reduction Convention, and recommended to the people of that county, 100 votes against Ratification. There were eighteen Jurymen present, fifteen in favor, and three against the above presentation. The Grand Jury Est. is usually made up from the most intelligent citizens of the county; and we have no doubt, but a word from them in this way will have its influence. We hope this example of Cherokee, being the first court in the Circuit, will be followed by the Grand Juries in the other counties, as nothing can be of more importance to the people of Georgia at present, than an early expression of opinion, as to the fatal consequences that may result from the adoption of a measure so dangerous to republicanism, and so destructive to liberty. —Herald.

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THE GOVERNOR'S MISSIONARIES.—Since the late difficulty between Governor Lumpkin, and the pardoned Missionaries, he seems to think it necessary to send other Missionaries to this section of country. "His aids, though few, feeble, and selfish," as he described them to be, are travelling through the Cherokee country, circulating Handbills in favor of Ratification, upon the result of which, his Superintendent's success in remaining longer about the "Mighty Work-shop," so much depends.

The Governors aids, having despaired of his success upon his own merit, are now endeavoring to denify his prospects with that of Ratification; upon which ground, we are willing to meet them. The contest then will be between Wilson Lumpkin and Ratification, and Joel Crawford and No Ratification. —lb.

The Handbills alluded to are signed "Cottager," and the public are forewarned again at the doctrines contained in them, as the supposed author is an avowed advocate of the Force Bill, the Tariff, and Proclamation, and an acknowledged Federalist.
