REVOLUTIONARY SOLDIER DEAD: We last week announced the death of **Col. Rutherford** one of the soldiers of the Revolution. We see in the *Richmond Enquirer*, the departure of another veteran, **Capt. S. Tinsley**, aged 77 years, who died on the morning of the 22d ultimo, at the residence of his brother, **Col. Thomas Tinsley**, in Hanover County, Virginia. **Capt. tinsley** entered the revolutionary army at the early age of 18 years. After the close of the Revolutionary War he served under **Gen. Wayne** and distinguished himself in the Indian battles. After the peace with the Indians, he was stationed on the frontiers of Georgia at **Fort Wilkinson**. And afterwards on the reduction of the army, resided some time in Jones County and then returned some 12 years ago to Virginia and lived with his brother until his decease. **Capt. T.** was the first principal keeper of our Penitentiary.-(Source: GJ)

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equally put by the present appointment. It is still very uncertain, what course he may take on the present occasion. Yet has he been unceremoniously charged with office-hunting—and with an ambition which knows no bounds or discretion.

We have been surprised, but we cannot say surprised, at the coarse and illiberal remarks, which have been made in the public prints here and elsewhere, upon the qualifications of Mr. Daniel. He is a gentleman of a strong mind, of great firmness of character, of the most untiring industry, and the most unblemished integrity. We have before us a testimonial in his favor, so creditable to him, and so well calculated to arrest the torrent of vituperation which his enemies are pouring upon his head, that we cannot but republish it, in justice to him, as well as to the administration. It is from one, who knows Mr. Daniel well, both as a lawyer, a politician, and a man. It is a portion of Mr. Benjamin Watkins Leigh's speech, in the Virginia Convention, on Dec. 9, 1829—and runs as follows:

"I have been told a thousand times, since the Convention assembled—I do not mean in open debate, nor do I mean that I have been so told by the gentleman from Fauquier—for he avows himself a convert, in some measure, in respect to an Executive Council. I have been told, that the Council is a useless body, a set of loiterers, whose office is little better than a sinecure. I shall not reflect on the motives of this denunciation. I shall only say, that my observation and experience do not justify the truth of it. I shall not affirm, that this Council has always been filled with the ablest and most experienced men in the State: but I do affirm, that it has always been filled by men competent to their duties, and that those duties have been, in the main, wisely and prudently, and always honestly, discharged. The office has been held by men, two of whom have since filled the office of President, and one that of Chief Justice of the United States. The ablest men of Virginia have been in the Council: and I shall take occasion to say, that the present Lieutenant-Governor (I mean the gentleman, who, being the oldest Councillor, is charged with the duty of Lieutenant-Governor,) is in point of capacity, abundantly fit for the management of the affairs of this State, or any other State in the Union; and, in point of firmness, integrity and virtue, there is not a man in the Commonwealth that would be disparaged by a comparison with him."

The gentleman, here spoken of by Mr. Leigh, was Peter V. Daniel, Esq., then the Lieutenant-Governor of Virginia.—*Richmond Enquirer.*
