War pensioner per Womack Genealogy pgs 29, 30 & 87. He enlisted and served three or more tours as private in N.C. troopss and was in Battle of Brier Creek where he received a severe wound over left eye.

He moved, 1 January 1786 from Chatham Co. North Carolina to Hancock Co. Ga thence to Jones Co. Ga and sometime in 1825 to Monroe Co. Ga. On 8 May, 1825 in Jones Co Ga he married Lucy Moody, who was then about 44 years old and an "ole maid". Names of her parents not given.

Abraham Womack a private in Rev War for 12 months and 16 days was a pensioner from 4 Mar. 1831 to 10 Apr 1834 (date of his death) at \$41.75 per annum. Editor's Note WOMACK GENEALOGY: This Abraham Womack m/first (in 1760's) to Judith Minter d/o John and Elizabeth Morgan Minter of Chatham co NC. They lived in the southeast corner of Chatham Co in that part which fell into Lee Co in 1907 on or near the present Chatham-Lee line, perhaps ten miles northeast of Sanford NC.

### Minter-Morgan-Womack

John Minter (wife Elizabeth Morgan) moved into Chatham County about the time it was organized. Their daughter, Judith (Judy), married Abraham Womack, who was living in Orange County in 1770.

August 1771 Court Records show that Anthony Minter, John's brother, bought 140 acres of land lying on the fork of Cape Fear River from James Riddle. This transaction was signed by Joseph Brantley, John Minter, Morgan Minter and Jeremiah Minter. Morgan Minter married Joanna, daughter of Col. Robert Rutherford.

In 1775 John Minter deeded 120 acres on the northeast side of Deep River to Abraham Womack, who in 1778 bought 200 acres in Chatham County from Jeremiah Minter. In the National Archives there is record of commendation to Womack for his Revolutionary service. In preparing to leave Chatham County to live in Georgia, Womack in December, 1784, sold his land on Deep River to John Ramsey.

Other prominent members of the Womack family were Judge Thomas B. Womack, of Pittsboro, and his brother, Francis, who designed the present court house.

### Alston

Titular head of one of Chatham's distinguished early families was Joseph John Alston, Jr., (1767-1841), who was called "Chatham Jack."

While there are many stories to substantiate the fact that one or two of the Alstons were in Chatham County during the Revolution the record of "Chatham Jack's" entry is 1791. He came from Halifax County. Much of his father's wealth has been left to him and he came to own 40,000 acres in Chatham County and many slaves. Nearly all of the land along the present Highway 64 from Pittsboro to Siler City was Alston owned. It was on this land that he built his home and homes for his children. "Chatham Jack's" home stood near the present Ward Snarr home and he is buried in the family cemetery nearby. Three of the Alston homes still stand, "Aspen Hall," home of son Gideon; the Degraphenreidt home,

Phillip Alston, half-brother of "Chatham Jack," lived on Deep River in the "House of the Horse Shoe." Another half-brother, William, who lived in Chatham, married Sarah Yeargin, and their daughter, Anne, who married Edward Rives, has many descendants in the county today. With the death of Lacy Alston in 1958, the last descendant by the name disappeared from the county.

Space forbids recounting any of the stories which center around the colorful "Chatham Jack."

#### The Rives Family

Spelled variously Reve, Reives, Reeves and Reaves, the Rives family, of French origin, came to America from England about 1400. Thomas Henry Rives came to Chatham County about 1790, possibly because of friendship with the Goldston family, bought land from William Goldston and built his home, called "The Barraks."

One of the eight children of Thomas, Edward and his wife, Mary Ann Alston Rives, built their home, "Peddlar's Hill," between Meronies Methodist Church and Goldston.

Many descendants of the early Rives live in the Bear Creek and Goldston areas. They married into Turner, Edwards, Thweatt, McMath, Wilkinson, Brooks, Kirk, Smith, Reid, Goldston, Marsh and Headen families.

#### Goldston

William, Charles and John Goldston (sometimes spelled Gholson or Ghoulson) were three brothers born in Scotland, who came to Chatham just ahead of the Rives family. There were many marriages between the two families.

William and Charles lived for a time along Deep River, part of their land being in Moore and Randolph Counties. William settled between Rocky River and Bear Creek to Tick Creek west. He fought in the Revolution and was a captain in the state militia. One of his grandsons was Joseph John Goldston, Jr., for whom the town of Goldston was named. Fanning harbored special hatred for William Goldston, expressed the desire to kill him and did burn his home.

## THE NEGRO

### Slavery In Chatham County

The institution of slavery was well established in North Carolina before the creation of Chatham County. The first Federal census, taken in the year 1790, registered 9,221 as the population of Chatham County. Of this number, 1,632 were slaves owned by 310 slave holders. The percentage of whites who owned slaves in Chatham was very low. The number of slaves, who were owned by slave holders, ranged from one to 68. There were few residents of the county who owned ten or more slaves. Within the next few decades the slave population increased considerably. In 1790 the citizens of the county had not found much favor with the institution of slavery. Only a few people owned more than ten slaves.

The Census of 1790 shows that the following ten or more slaves: George Lucas, 68; Matthew Jones, 42; Philip Taylor, 36; Thomas Stokes, 27; Burwell Williams, 20; John Montgomery, 18; Sarah Ragland, 17; Gideon Goodwin, 17; Christopher Kirksey, 17; James Taylor, 18; William Clark, 17; James Anderson, 15; Jacob Flowers, 15; Sarah Scurlock, 14; Presley Cox, 13; Joseph Rosser, 13; Benjamin Harris, 12; Joseph Bridges, 12; Francis Jones, 12; John Justin, 12; Joseph Brantly, 12; Isaac Brooks, 12; Zachariah Harmon, 11; Thomas Evans, 11; John Minter, 10; Elisha Cain, 10; Thomas Evans, 10; William Brantly, 10; Mary Brantly, 10; William Glossen, 10; Nathan Stedman, 10.

The time did come, however, when many of the citizens counted their slaves by the hundreds. The 1830 census shows a total population of 16,242 for Chatham County of which more than 3,000 were slaves. The slave population was at its highest in 1850 when the census shows, 3,107 slaves in Chatham County's upper district alone. By 1860 the slave population was widely dispersed in the eastern part of the county rather than in the

 Memorialists, who have petitioned the Board of War in Green County and some few Individuals who  
 have used every Endeavour in their Power to thrust in a Set of Self-Officers into  
 the Battalion who are Grievous to the Minds of the Major part of the people the said Board  
 have appointed a person for Lieut Colonel who Actually was at that time a Student of Wilkes County the Person  
 appointed for first Colonel was not nor is not now a Free Holder in the Battalion the Person appointed  
 for second Colonel is one of the youngest Captains a second Lieutenant your Memorialists are told has been lately  
 appointed Captain Robert Middleton first Lieutenant. But as the said Robert has sold his former home and  
 this Battalion and is about to remove himself into Washington County where his property chiefly is  
 being a person of such Independent Property as would render him incapable of the Duty of a  
 Memorialists conceive there is no other person who is qualified to fill the said  
 position of their Regiment in the Battalion. We therefore humbly request your Excellency  
 to be so good as to appoint the said Middleton, only to Leave the persons  
 in the Battalion your Memorialists are further

# Some **A**merican **P**risoners of the **B**ritish **A**rmy in **N**orth **C**arolina, **1781**

The year 1780 closed after five and one-half years of war with only the American victory at King's Mountain to brighten the patriot hopes in the South. The selection of American commanders in the southern department had been most unfortunate on the part of the Congress. Major General Robert HOWE had lost Savannah and all of Georgia in 1778 to a superior British force. His successor, General Benjamin LINCOLN, won small victories at Kettle Creek and Port Royal Island in February 1779, but then suffered a defeat at Briers Creek, failed to retake Savannah, and was captured in May 1780 with over 5,000 American troops as the British took Charleston and, eventually, the rest of South Carolina. Over General WASHINGTON's objections, Congress selected Horatio GATES, one of the heroes of Saratoga, as the new commander in the South. With 3,000 ill-equipped men, GATES met the British at Camden, South Carolina, and was routed. The American cause was at a low ebb, and Congress finally deferred to General WASHINGTON's choice of Nathanael GREENE, who took command in the South at Charlotte, N. C., in December 1780.

After their defeat at King's Mountain [S.C., October 1780], the British under CORNWALLIS had pulled back to Winnsboro, S.C., in preparation for an invasion of North Carolina. GREENE had inherited an army of almost 2,500 men... on paper,



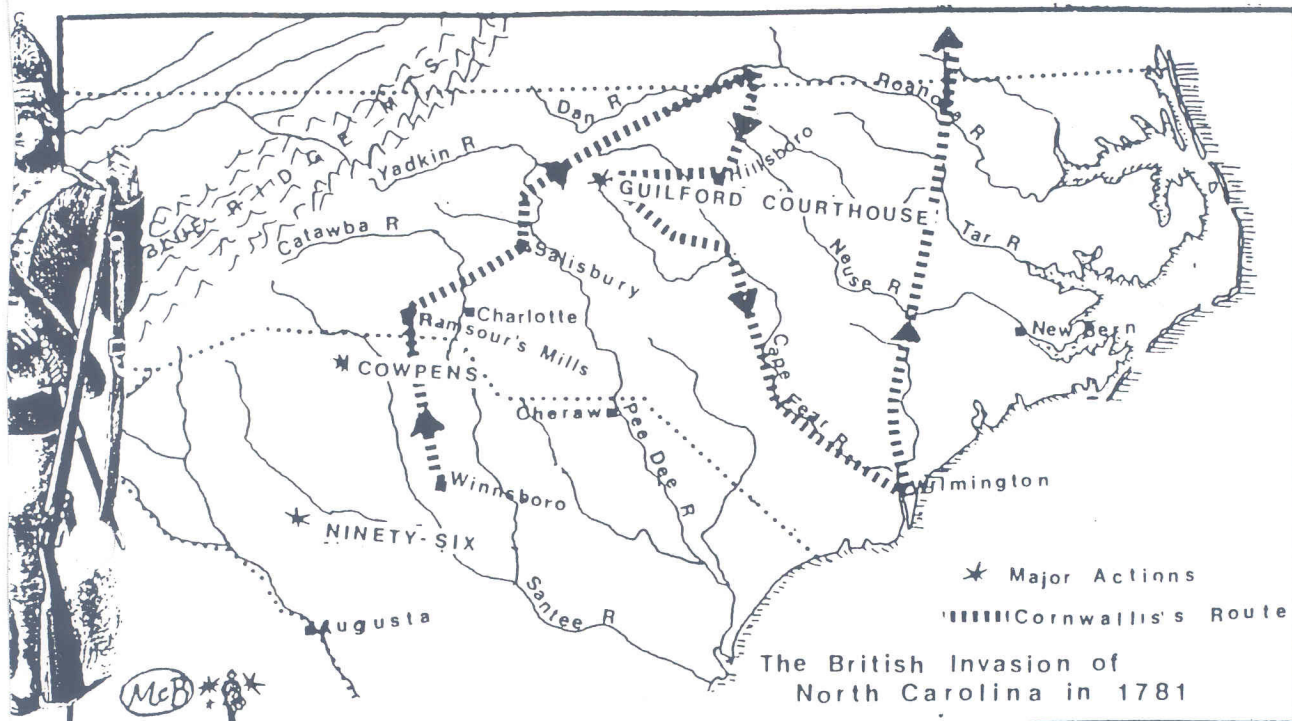

whom only 1,500 were present and fit for duty, and fewer than 800 were properly clothed and equipped. In mid-December, he made a decision to move a larger part of his forces along the Pee Dee River to near Cheraw, South Carolina, where he would partially solve his food problem, while he split off a smaller segment of the army under the tough old Virginian, Colonel Daniel MORGAN, to the south and west towards the British post at Ninety-six [S.C.]. CORNWALLIS was shocked when he



word of GREENE's decision to split his inferior army in the face of a superior British force of some 4,000. To meet this audacious American threat, CORNWALLIS sent Colonel Banastre TARLETON's Legion galloping off to intercept MORGAN's Corps and destroy it, while CORNWALLIS with the main force moved cautiously into North Carolina, where it would be in a position to deal with the remnants of MORGAN's force after its expected defeat by TARLETON. On the 17th of January, 1781, TARLETON's Legion met Daniel MORGAN's mainly raw militia at Hannah's Cowpens in South Carolina and suffered a crushing defeat as nearly nine-tenths of the British force was either killed or captured. Realizing that CORNWALLIS's much greater army was in the field, MORGAN led his victorious forces back into North Carolina towards the camp on the east side of the Catawba River.

In the meantime, CORNWALLIS's main force had moved slowly and cautiously and did not take up the pursuit until the 19th, thus letting MORGAN slip away. Part of the British delay lay in waiting for additional supplies to arrive from Charleston from which CORNWALLIS had determined to cut himself loose in anticipation of a planned invasion. On the 25th, he arrived at Ramsour's Mills (now at Lincoln, N.C.), where he realized that he would never catch the Americans unless he moved faster than they did. For the next two days, he destroyed his superfluous baggage in order to transform his cumbersome force into light troops to hasten the pursuit. General GREENE, in the meantime, ordered General Isaac HUGER of South Carolina to take the other half of the southern army (at Cheraw) to Salisbury, while GREENE proceeded with a small cavalry escort to join MORGAN at the Catawba, which he did on 30 January. GREENE soon began making plans for the retreat of the American army into Virginia.



On the 28th, CORNWALLIS moved towards MORGAN's force but was unable to cross the Catawba because heavy rains had swollen its banks. On the 31st, he was able to cross at Cowan's ford and made a surprise attack against General DAVIDSON's North Carolina militia, which was guarding the ford on March 31. DAVIDSON was killed, and the militia was dispersed, but MORGAN's force had departed a day earlier, had slipped away to join HUGER's at Guilford. CORNWALLIS was unable to pursue rapidly, again because of high water in the Deep and the Yadkin Rivers. GREENE, by this time down to about 1,000 men, reassessed the situation and elected to carry out the plan to retreat to the Dan River, where he had already assembled boats, into Virginia. On the 14th of March, the last elements of GREENE's army were crossing the Dan as CORNWALLIS's elements came into view, but the British were unable to follow for lack of boats. The British were now in an exposed position, some 250 miles from their British-held supply base at Wilmington, and after a short rest, were forced to retreat back on Hillsboro on the 17th. On the next day, GREENE sent LEE's and PICKEN's partisans back across the Dan to harass the British and secure LEE's quick victory over Col. John PYLE's Tory mounted infantry resorted to Tory elements from trying to join the British.

On 25 February, GREENE recrossed the Dan into North Carolina. For the next two and one-half weeks, the opposing forces maneuvered in the vicinity of the Dan as GREENE's army slowly built up. On the 14th of March, GREENE made a surprise attack on the Courthouse with a greatly augmented army of some 4,300 men, more than he had ever been in battle before. On the next day, CORNWALLIS moved his force of some 1,900 battle-trained veterans to meet the Americans. CORNWALLIS advanced steadily through GREENE's lines, but at a large cost in casualties. CORNWALLIS, not wanting to risk all to gain a decisive victory, withdrew in order to regroup, leaving the field to the enemy. CORNWALLIS had won a tactical victory but at a quarter of his men were killed or wounded. Too weak to pursue, CORNWALLIS turned towards his supply base at Wilmington via Cross Creek (near Crossville), where he hoped to receive help from the many Scottish Loyalists in the area.

Throughout this entire campaign, the British continually picked up deserters and detained them as prisoners of war. Some lists of these prisoners are held by CORNWALLIS's Provost Marshall and have survived and are shown below.<sup>1</sup> The names listed are Americans, although a few are those of British soldiers and sailors from Hessian units. Some of these lists were also used to record events after capture, such as noting a death, sickness or a recommendation for parole. These notations often had no bearing to the initial column of names. The names are repeated on different listings for different purposes. The letters "E", "P" or "R" opposite some names is not explained in the original documents. Each list is separated by a line of asterisks for convenience. All of the lists were for the year 1781.

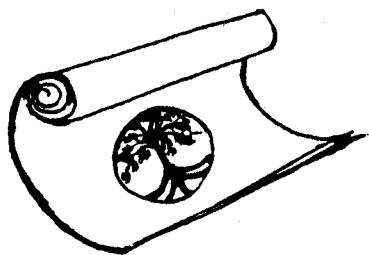
